Let me introduce you to my co-president, **Jean Munro**. She's been a member of Highline AAUW since April 2005. Jean works at Highline College, where she is Work First Services and Women's Programs Advisor Coordinator. She says her job doesn't pay a lot but "it's very rewarding to see someone learning to make more money than I do!"

Jean was born in Nashville, TN, the sixth of seven children, and moved to Juneau when she was eight years old. Her father was an artist and museum curator. Jean says they loaded up the seven kids in a VW van, with a canoe and two dogs, and moved to the "great white north" where snow was plentiful. Jean's mother returned to school for her own GED, then college and graduate school, and retired as a director for the Alaska State Education Division with a full pension. She also taught GED and ESL in her earlier career and monitored the K-

12 curriculum requirements.

With many different jobs behind her, Jean entered Highline College as a student in 1981. She transferred to Western for her B.A. and M.Ed. in Adult Education. She describes herself as passionate about women's issues, pay equity, and social justice. "I want to see women succeed in reaching their goals," she says. Getting young women interested in STEM with the A is one of her passions, and she hopes to see continued AAUW collaboration.



"Women always seem to get the back burner," she says. She tries to give each of her students that little extra time, that little extra word that can make such a difference for someone.

Jean's hobbies include hiking, biking, and skiing. She enjoys arts and crafts, and hopes to have time to do more.

The meeting opened at 10:30 A.M.

Agenda Items

- Eva reported on Tech Trek and the online activities the girls completed. She also reported that our branch did not send any representatives. She reported that the colleges are planning for 2022 camps dates. It was still undecided to if it would be virtual or in-person. The cost per person would be \$1100 per person. Our group now has \$4000 in the bank.
- Wendy Wenger asked Eva about the high school scholars and their recognition this year and last. Eva reported that each girl received a letter of recognition as well as a certificate from the state. There was no inperson celebration this year due to the current pandemic.
- Membership renewals were discussed. Vicki Moore is a new member. We currently have 35 members with a possibility of 36. Questions were asked about honoring Georgette Valley with a lifetime membership paid by the group. It was approved.
- Anneliese reported that we have \$6,075.31 in the bank with \$4000.00 held in reserve for High School Scholars STEM. A generous donation of \$6000 was also on in the account for TechTrek. Wendy Wenger and Anneliese will become co-signers along with Kay Crane. This year's officer must be listed in the minutes.
- Public Policy position was discussed. It was clarified that Kerry Lohr would be covering national issues where Emily Hitchens would cover the state level.
- Ideas were discussed about 2021-22 year's activities. Emily suggested quarterly meetings during the COVID period. Plus, our theme for the year was discussed and approved: Diversity, Equality, and Inclusion (DEI). Ideas suggested for future meetings were:
- 1. Kay Crane: speaking regarding the Muckleshoot Indians
- 2. Jean Munro: update on Title IX
- 3. Anneliese Ellerton: small groups such as gardening, walking, etc. It was mentioned that a book sale would be helpful to raise funds for the group. The problems of the book sale for this area were discussed. There are too many discount bookstores in the city proper making the required time and money to set up the sale more than what might be collected. Instead, it was decided to have a book exchange between members and to invite our book club members to participate.
- 4. Mary Kay said that she would check into Puget Sounds Skill Center (PSSC) for the month of October. This is where the book exchange might occur if the building is open and the students are serving meals.

Our AAUW Highline (WA) website is being updated!


It has been a couple of years since our website was updated. Some of our members have volunteered to work on revamping the web pages.

Virtual Walking Groups

At the Board meeting we talked about interest groups and one suggestion was a walking group. Since we have to mind Covid protocols I thought perhaps we could have a 'pretend' interest group and share interesting places to walk in King County.

Carol Erickson shared this one, the Oxbow Loop Trail, and Lowell and I went on it this week. It's out of North Bend on the Middle Fork of the Snoqualmie River. It's about 2.0 miles and a good trail, not much incline. The lake is shaped like an oxbow. The area is very peaceful. Take I 90 to exit 34 and go left on 468th and right on Middle Fork Rd. From Mailbox peak trailhead continue about 6 miles to the Oxbow trailhead. There is a small parking area first and a little bigger parking area



next to a bathroom. There is a short connecting trail from there to the trailhead and other parking area.

You will need a Discover Pass for this park.
