YOUTH STEM EVENT 2022

Highline College's WorkFirst and Women's Programs office, Techbridge and two AAUW branches, Highline and SE King County, collaborated on a virtual program held on Saturday, March 26, to encourage youngsters in grades 7 and 8 to continue their science and math courses. Fifty students registered and 34 attended. The program was free of cost. Students of all backgrounds and identities had the opportunity to explore STEM careers and pathways. The keynote speaker discussed overcoming barriers to achieve professional goals. Students participated in interactive presentations facilitated by local professionals.

Several members of the college staff and AAUW members met regularly to plan, staff, and spread the word about the program. Kathleen Rathbun, president of SE King County AAUW branch, and Emily Hitchens from Highline branch worked hard to get information about the program out to teachers, parents and students in several school districts. I chose and contacted three of the presenters. Jean Munro, copresident with me of Highline branch AAUW, helped clarify our thoughts and assisted with scheduling issues. We worked with Nicole Parker, Sean Kerr, Alycia Williams and Laquita Fields from Highline College's WorkFirst and Women's Programs office.

The keynote speaker was Dr. Amelia Phillips, a lead faculty member of Highline College's Bachelor of Applied Science in Cyber Security and Forensics. She spoke of her own journey from Army brat whose mother died in a car crash to M.I.T. and on to NASA, then into cyber security. She has taught in Namibia and considers it her second home.

Another speaker from the College faculty was Aeriel Wauhob, who has bachelor's degrees in both Wildlife Biology and Art. She is the lead community engagement coordinator for the Highline College Marine Science and Technology Center (MaST). She took students on a virtual tour of the MaST center and explained how she uses art and science together.

"The MaST also hosts frequent events that allow any member of the community to experience the facility: Community members are welcome to enjoy the MaST Center on Saturdays for free A yearly summer day camp is available to children in 4th, 5th and 6th grade. Volunteer opportunities are readily available to the public through the MaST Center, including but not limited to participation on the Marine Mammal Stranding Team, hosting Water Weekends and more!" Physical Therapist Sandra Ruiz holds a BA from the University of Missouri in Psychology and Spanish and a doctorate in Physical Therapy from Northwestern University in Chicago. She discussed the different types of physical therapists and the many venues where they work, helping patients reduce pain and improve function. She stressed that a journey to a STEM career can be non-linear and even include the arts

Dr. Anna Cogen, M.D., Ph.D., an assistant professor of dermatology at the University of Washington, talked about her research on skin infections and offered some suggestions for keeping the skin healthy. She stressed the importance of focusing on what excites you as you decide on a career path.

Preetha Chatterjee, Senior Engineering Director at Outreach, earned her bachelor's degree at NIT Tricky, India, and then her Master's of Science specializing in Computer Science from the University of Arizona in Tucson. She talked about the history and future of coding and provided students with tips on where to begin learning to code.

Kathleen Shoemaker Jinguji has many years of experience in leadership coaching, employment counseling and other human resource areas. She talked with the students about Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) in five core competencies: self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making. She is vice president of Soroptimist International of Seattle South, and was introduced by the president, Sharon Mann.

Kathleen Rathbun thanked all the presenters for their interesting programs. She encouraged students to fill out the evaluation forms. Those who did were entered in a drawing for four gift certificates. The program was recorded and will be released pending permissions.

Most of the students (93.4%) rated their experience with the program as "good" or "excellent." Their comments on "best part of the event" included: the coding presentation, the dermatologist, the information about marine biology, the physical therapy section ("I enjoyed watching the presentation and learning about the different forms and versions of those occupations"), hearing about what to study about a certain job, learning about stem and sea life, and "My favorite part was when we talked about animals/mammals."

The general comments from these 7th and 8th graders made all the effort worthwhile.

This was an excellent conference and I enjoyed all the presentations. I hope to see and share the video soon."

Highline College staff designed the flier, wrote the registration forms and then dealt with registration. They provided the technical support to run the virtual program, while AAUW contacted potential speakers and publicized the program to schools, parents and students. The collaboration itself was successful!

Accessing AAUW's New "Community Hub"

Now Required for Renewals & Donations - Barbara Sando (Seattle Branch)

As you might already be aware, AAUW's Member Services Database (MSD), where you could find your membership information on AAUW's website, has been replaced by the "Community Hub." The Community Hub can't be accessed with the login you used with the MSD. We are encouraging all of our members to set up their new Community Hub login because you'll need it for online renewals and donations going forward. Information and tutorial videos are available at https://www.aauw.org/new-systems-update/, or you can follow the instructions here.

Steps to set up your Community Hub login:

- 1. Go to https://www.aauw.org/ and click on "Log In" (top, right corner). The Welcome screen / Log In page for the Community Hub will come up.
- 2. Click on "Forgot your password?" (bottom of page).
- 3. In the "Reset your password" box, enter the email address that is on file with AAUW and click at the bottom.
- 4. You will then receive an email with instructions on how to reset your password. If you do not receive this email, please contact me at finance@aauw-seattle.org for assistance.

Important next step: Once you are logged into the Community Hub and see your "Personal Snapshot" (contact info, etc.), check to see if your educational degree information is there. As it stands right now, the Education fields have to be filled in before you can renew. Each degree listed must have a "Completion Date" with the month, day and year. You must use the mm/dd/yyyy format. If you don't recall the exact date, just pick a date that's sometime shortly after you know that you received your degree.

We will be learning more about this new system – which has the usual startup glitches - between now and May when we will be formally kicking off our membership renewal season. Good luck! And, stand by for more information next month.



A Wolf at the Schoolhouse Door: The Dismantling of Public Education and the Future of School by Jack Schneider and Jennifer Berkshire

A trenchant analysis of how public education is being destroyed in overt and deceptive ways—and how to fight back

Betsy DeVos may be the most prominent face of the push to dismantle public education, but she is in fact part of a large movement that's been steadily gaining power and notching progress for decades—amassing funds, honing their messaging, and crafting policies. While support for public

education today is stronger than ever, the movement to save our schools remains fragmented, variable, and voluntary. Meanwhile, those set on destroying this beloved institution are unified, patient, and well resourced.

In *A Wolf at the Schoolhouse Door*, Jennifer Berkshire and Jack Schneider, co-hosts of the popular education podcast *Have You Heard*, lay out the increasingly potent network of conservative elected officials, advocacy groups, funders, and think tanks that have aligned behind a radical vision to unmake public education. They describe the dogma underpinning the work of the dismantlers and how it fits into the current political context, giving readers an up-close look at the policies—school vouchers, the war on teachers' unions, tax credit scholarships, virtual schools, and more—driving the movement's agenda. Finally they look forward, surveying the world the dismantlers threaten to build.

As teachers from coast to coast mobilize with renewed vigor, this smart, essential book sounds an alarm, one that should incite a public reckoning on behalf of the millions of families served by the American educational system—and many more who stand to suffer from its unmaking.



Anzac Girls: The Extraordinary Story Of Our World War 1 Nurses – By Peter Rees

By the end of World War 1, 45 Australian and New Zealand nurses had died on overseas service, and over 200 decorated. These were the women who left for war looking for adventure and romance, but were soon confronted with challenges for which their civilian lives could never have prepared them. Their strength and dignity were remarkable. Using diaries and letters Peter Rees takes us into the hospital camps and the wards and the tent surgeries on the edge of some of the most horrific battlefronts of human history. But he also allows the friendships and love of these

courageous and compassionate women to enrich their experiences, and ours. Profoundly moving, this is a story of extraordinary courage and humanity shown by a group of woman whose contribution to the Anzac legend has barely been recognized in our history. Peter Rees has changed that understanding forever.
