

April was the second month in an early Roman calendar, but became the fourth when the ancient Romans started using January as the first month.

April is named for the Greek goddess of love, Aphrodite.

The name for the month of April originally came for *Aprilis*, which means to open.

- Small animals that hibernate are usually coming out of their burrows in April. The birds fly back northward and settle down to have their families. The bees and butterflies begin to gather nectar from the first flowers of the season. In some parts of the world, it is planting time, while in other parts, it is the harvest season.
- April is Humor Month, so laugh it up!
- The birthstone for April is the diamond.
- The zodiac signs are Aries (March 21 April 19) and Taurus (April 20-May 20).
- The birth flowers for the month of April are the sweet pea and the daisy.

## **Annual Dues Renewal 2023-2024**

AAUW National is increasing its annual fee from \$67 to \$72. The overall cost will be \$95.00 (National \$72, State \$10, and Branch \$13). Friends of the Highline branch will only be required to pay the \$13 branch dues. It was moved and seconded that annual dues will become payable from April 1 through June 30 for a centralized dues payment system. If dues are not received by mid-June, reminder calls will be made.

Per Anneliese, treasurer, the process will be as follows:

Checks received from members will be deposited into the Highline branch bank account, and then submitted to the AAUW community hub. If members pay directly online, the treasurer and member will receive notification from AAUW that payments have been distributed to the appropriate funds. Dues renewal information will be posted in the April newsletter. It was suggested that someone bring a laptop to a branch meeting to assist members who may want to pay online.

The board suggested that one of the branch members should be eligible for Honorary Life Membership, but AAUW records did not show the required 50 years of membership. A form will be sent to AAUW to confirm that this member has been a member for over 50 years.

The speaker will be Maureen Frisch from Grandmothers Against Gun Violence (GAGV). The meeting will be held at Wesley Gardens in the 5<sup>th</sup> floor Club Room, from 10 AM to 12 PM. Wesley will provide coffee/tea service for about 30 people with the board providing some treats.

The board will call members to find out who plans on attending and check on how they are doing. Emily will bring applications to join AAUW for any guest who might be interested in joining. Flyers on 2023 Washington State Activity on GAGV Priorities will be available at the meeting. It was also suggested to ask our speaker if she needed any video equipment to facilitate her presentation. Jean said she would post the meeting announcement on the AAUW Highline Facebook page. 

## The Day The World Came To Town; 9/11 In Gander, by Jim DeFede



The True Story Behind the Events on 9/11 that Inspired Broadway's Smash Hit Musical Come from Away, Featuring All New Material from the Author

When 38 jetliners bound for the United States were forced to land at Gander International Airport in Canada by the closing of U.S. airspace on September 11, the population of this small town on Newfoundland Island swelled from 10,300 to nearly 17,000. The citizens of Gander met the stranded passengers with an overwhelming display of friendship and goodwill.

As the passengers stepped from the airplanes, exhausted, hungry and distraught after being held on board for nearly 24 hours while security checked all of the baggage, they were greeted with a feast prepared by the townspeople. Local bus drivers who had been on strike came off the picket lines to transport the passengers to the various shelters set up in local schools and churches. Linens and toiletries were bought and donated. A middle school provided showers, as well as access to computers, email, and televisions, allowing the passengers to stay in touch with family and follow the news.

Over the course of those four days, many of the passengers developed friendships with Gander residents that they expect to last a lifetime. As a show of thanks, scholarship funds for the children of Gander have been formed and donations have been made to provide new computers for the schools. This book recounts the inspiring story of the residents of Gander, Canada, whose acts of kindness have touched the lives of thousands of people and been an example of humanity and goodwill. ## Museum of Extraordinary Things, by Alice Hoffman


