"SAFETY FIRST" by Kay Crane, Co-President

President Biden has just created a White House Office of Gun Violence Prevention, to be overseen by Vice President Kamala Harris. Its goal is to accelerate efforts to reduce gun violence, to coordinate and expand partnerships with cities and states, and to support victims.

I expect each of us has a gun violence story to tell. Some years ago I worked at High Point Library for Seattle Public Library. One of the youngsters who came often to the library had quite a scar on her cheek. "Oh, yes," she said. "I used to live in Los Angeles. I was just a baby and my teenaged aunt was carrying me around outside. There was a drive-by shooting. The bullet went through my cheek." Years later I was tutoring for the Highline School District, working with too-young mothers who received a few weeks of tutoring around the time of the birth. One mom was living with the boyfriend's family on 4th Avenue SW. We usually sat on the sofa in the front room together, but this particular day she waved me through to the kitchen in the back of the house. "Oh, yes," she said. "There was a drive-by shooting. The sofa where we used to sit has bullets inside it now, so we don't use the front room anymore."

Fengting Yan, M.D., wrote a stirring OpEd in *The Seattle Times* recently about losing her nurse to gun violence when the young woman was attending an event at the Gorge. Dr. Yan is my medical oncologist, and deals with life and death every day. She says her patients are asking what a person can do.

You can help. **Grandmothers Against Gun Violence** is working hard right here in Washington State to support sensible efforts to protect us all from gun violence. You do not have to be a grandmother to join and you don't even have to be a woman. You do have to be 18 years old, because we lobby. In fact, our lobbying has helped demand background checks for gun sales, safe storage requirements, and restriction of open carry. "Grandmothers" is one of the partners of The Alliance for Gun Responsibility. You will find grandmothersagainstgunviolence.org on your computer or phone. Just follow the prompts to join. The usual fee is \$50 for a year's membership, but Grandmothers will gladly accept whatever you can afford. The membership year coincides with the calendar year, but I have it on good authority from the Treasurer that anyone who joins now is paid up until January 1, 2025.

The White House Office of Gun Violence Prevention is a wonderful recognition of how badly our country manages guns. Too many people are frightened, scarred

or killed every week. Here in Washington State, Grandmothers can provide you with a way to make your voice heard on a subject all too close to home.

Project Feast empowers refugee and immigrant cooks by preparing them for culinary careers and becoming food entrepreneurs. Participants reside in South King County and many are lowincome women. The program is located at 202 W Gowe St, Kent, WA 98032 - Phone: (253) 236-5297.

Of note are three programs:

The Culinary Skills Apprentice program combines classroom, kitchen, and ESL lessons to prepare English Language learners for a good job in a food business or to start their own food business.

Family Meals to Go is a weekly meal which can be ordered on Tuesday for pickup on Thursdays between 12-2 pm at the Café in Kent. Each week's meal is inspired by one of the apprentices. Ordering is open to anyone and vegan options are available. Catering is also available which Saltwater enjoyed at our recent Pledge Drive celebration dinner.

The Community Meals program provides culturally appropriate emergency meals for immigrant and refugee families as well as seniors. The Kent School District participates in this supplemental food program.




A Different Cruise



Cruises are our dance around the world! We love to unpack once and see different places. On our recent cruise in August, we flew to Lisbon, Portugal to begin our voyage.


We saw the Belem Tower, a monument to the Portuguese explorers, and ate a pastry called pastel-de-nata (a buttery vanilla custard tart).



What a great branch meeting we had!


The event was held at Wesley Gardens Club Room and very special, since our

Members brought samples from their favorite recipes and shared them as well as stories about the recipes.





The Plague and I - by Betty McDonald



Tuberculosis. A terrifying word, as terrifying then as cancer is now. It meant entering a sanatorium for treatment, leaving her family, her children. And what if she did not recover? Hardly the basis for comedy, one would suppose. And one would be wrong. Betty MacDonald always had the ability to face up to adversity -- and heaven knows she had enough in her life -- so after the initial shock had passed, she proceeded to laugh at her illness, the other patients, the nurses, the doctors, and -- chiefly -- herself. Humor was her greatest medicine; right up to the day she left the sanatorium, cured. Of course she had her bad moments when despair and tragedy underlying what she saw and heard refused to be pushed into the background, but she had the grit and wit to rise above it. The

result is a lively, cheerful and most funny book. In fact, it's a tonic. (GoodReads)

The Age of Innocence – by Edith Wharton



The Age of Innocence is Edith Wharton's twelfth novel, initially serialized in four parts in the Pictorial Review magazine in 1920, and later released by D. Appleton and Company as a book in New York and in London. It won the 1921 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, making it the first novel written by a woman to win the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, and thus Wharton the first woman to win the prize.
