SAVING COLOR by Kay Crane, Co-President

September! Days a little shorter. Back to school. Dentist appointments and new shoes. New classroom, new teacher. New schoolbooks. Looking forward a little bit to the colder weather, sweaters, and winter coat.

Here in the Northwest, we know that the issue we have with winter is not so much the cold as the dark. The sun rises later and later each day and sets earlier and earlier. We get less and less light as the days go by.

But throughout September we can expect some good weather (defined here as "it's not raining right now") and perhaps even walking weather.

What I challenge you to do is to collect colors. Figure out for yourself a walking route you will enjoy, perhaps in a park, perhaps just in your neighborhood. Plan to walk the same route often so you can look deeply at the plants you pass.

Pay attention to the trees as you walk. Have the conifers set their pinecones? Are the cones large or small on that particular tree? Does the tree produce just a few cones or does it bear hundreds? Does the tree have lots of new growth, or just a little? Often the new growth will be a paler green than the older needles. File those lovely "new" green colors in your mind for future reference, for the time when the new growth darkens to match the old.

The deciduous trees are often the shining stars here. Longer nights will make the chlorophyll of green leaves fade out, leaving the glorious yellows and reds of fall. Again, pay attention on your walk. Harvest those bright, intense colors to store in your mind for the darker months ahead.

One group of deciduous trees to "collect" as you walk are the red Japanese maples. These small shapely trees have delicate dark red or green leaves all summer, and will lose them in the autumn, but they may turn a brilliant red before they fall. Look for them on your walk and notice how handsomely they set off the conifers near them.

As I write this in mid-August, I notice that the Sweetgum tree at the foot of our driveway has begun to paint its farthermost and highest branches with a red-tinged brush, as if the tree itself were reaching for a warm red sweater.

Store up some color for yourself to warm your eyes during the winter, and enjoy your walks!

One of them is calling the president of Renton Technical College to see about a suitable room for a large community-wide meeting, with a panel of librarians from five different library systems (King County, Seattle, Snohomish, Pierce and Timberland) who are all approaching the current book challenge situation differently. They are inviting a news anchor to moderate and will invite TV coverage. Proposed date is Saturday October 21. They expect to cover all costs, including bringing someone in for the weekend from Timberland. They absolutely want AAUW participation, from Highline, and of course we can invite other branches to join us. The current effort is to educate the new young voters. They will see to advertising.

Then, they are talking about additional programs to be available around the state, perhaps with State AAUW participation, for educators, librarians, school boards, etc., anyone involved with book challenges, and programs to be again open to the public and well publicized. Emily, I cannot speak for State AAUW, of course, but I would hope we would be delighted to sign on for this."

From the Seattle Times - Aug. 25, 2023 at 10:00 am

On July 30, Antenucci and Westling set the <u>fastest known time</u> for a self-supported female pair on Mount Rainier's Infinity <u>Loop</u>, finishing in three days, 22 hours, 19 minutes, 38 seconds. They beat the previous record, held by <u>Issaquah</u> <u>ultrarunner Kaytlyn Gerbin</u> and Portland's Alex Borsuk, by about six hours. Gerbin and Borsuk were the first known women to complete the loop. The Infinity Loop features two summits of Rainier and the entire Wonderland Trail. It's a 143mile feat that includes more than 44,000 feet of elevation gain.

We're Better Than This- by Elijah Cummings



Known for his poise, intellect, and influence until his death in October 2019, Elijah Cummings was one of the most respected figures in contemporary politics, a politician who held fast to his beliefs but was not afraid to reach across the aisle in the name of friendship and progress. Since his earliest days in government through his time as a representative and chairman of the House Oversight and Reform Committee, he proved his abilities as a politician who could operate at the highest levels of democracy, serving the people of Baltimore and illustrating the importance of working with—and for—the underdog. *Amazon*



Whose Body? - by Dorothy Sayers

There's a corpse in the bathtub, wearing nothing but a pair of pince-nez spectacles. Enter Lord Peter Wimsey, the original gentleman sleuth. Urged to investigate by his mother, the Dowager Duchess of Denver, Lord Peter quickly ascertains that the sudden disappearance of a well-known financier is in some way connected to the body in the bathroom. But discovering exactly which way they're related leads the amateur detective on a merry chase. Written by a master of the detective story, this atmospheric tale abounds in the cozy delights of an English murder mystery. Dorothy L. Sayers ranks with Agatha Christie as a defining author of the genre. A novelist, essayist, and medieval scholar, Sayers was among the first

women to receive an Oxford degree, and her translations of Dante remain in wide circulation. This novel marks the debut of her most popular creation, Lord Peter Wimsey, whose continuing adventures unfold amid the lively world of upper-crust British society in the 1920s.
