OUCH!



Someone managed to use my credit card for some sort of purchase. I don't even know what they bought, and I really don't care. The point is, it wasn't me and it wasn't Garry. I found out when I looked at the detailed list online of our various charges on

the credit card. This one stood out as not something we could identify, for \$49.95.

I called the credit card company. The charge was still pending, so the company suggested I wait to dispute the charge officially until the charge was posted. A couple of days later, there it was, posted. I called the company again, and they said they needed to pull the card and issue us a new number. We've had to do this before, and it seemed like the most awful nuisance, but here we go again. Our new cards came promptly. We have activated them with just one easy phone call, and we now have our new number. Next up, we need to notify every vendor who used to use our previous card number that we now have a new number.

Scams are all around us, it seems. Are the people replacing your roof actually using the shingles you ordered? For one friend of mine, as a matter of fact, no, they weren't. Is the young boy at the door selling chocolate bars actually trying to support a local kids' football team? As a matter of fact, the team no longer exists. From investments of thousands down to a couple bucks for candy, scams seem to be multiplying like toadstools after a rain.

We had a couple of guys turn up at the door one day, asking if they could look over our roof for their company, since they were doing work in the area and could give us a good deal. They climbed all over the roof and gave us the unhappy news that we needed a new roof, for something like \$40,000. I said thank you, and called a roofer our son had dealt with successfully. They sent someone out. He climbed all over the roof, and said, "Your roof is fine. Here's my card. Call me if you need me." I will, gladly!

I've had a phone call from someone anxiously saying, "Grandma, I'm in trouble and I need money right away!" Really? Who is this? "Your grandson!" Really? Which one? "Michael." "Well, Michael, I hope your mother is proud of you. I have several grandsons, but not a Michael. And by the way, their voices haven't changed." One response to phone calls clearly asking for money is, "Oh, I'm so glad you called! Give me your credit card number right away so I can send money to it!" They hang up on me.

Do not give out ANY personal information over the phone unless you made the call in the first place. Your bank will not be calling you to get your social security number! The IRS never does business over the phone: if they need to get in touch with you, they will write you a letter.

A scammer will try to play on your emotions. One of the scammers' favorite methods is to make you feel rushed. Watch out particularly for "deals" that are good for only a very short time. A reputable company will be glad to do business with you at any time.

Let's make 2024 a year when none of us have to give up hard-earned money to scammers. **Be careful.** Check the statement. Call the bank yourself. And if it sounds too good to be true, it's probably not true. **Kay Crane**

Open Up AAUW



In spring 2024, AAUW members around the country will be voting on proposed National bylaws change that would fully open up AAUW membership by removing the requirement for a college degree.

> Proposed Amendment to "Open Up AAUW" Ready for Review and Comment **Deadline January 26th**

Members should have received an e-mail from AAUW Chief of Staff Shannon Wolfe on Monday, January 8th kicking off the comment period for the proposed amendment to "Open Up AAUW" by eliminating the degree requirement for AAUW membership. The e-mail included this link to the national website where you can review and comment on the proposal to open membership. There you will find the "Overview and Reasons for the Proposed Amendment," as well as a link to where your comments can be made. The comment period closes at 2 pm PST on Friday, January 26th. We encourage every member to review the proposed change and provide any feedback they have during the comment period.

After thoughtful discussion and a vote, the AAUW Washington State Board, as an entity, has taken a position in favor of supporting "Open Up AAUW". To support AAUW's value of being inclusive, and in recognizing that it doesn't take a college degree to believe in and fight for gender equity, the Board believes that opening up membership is a critical step in ensuring a strong future for AAUW as an organization. Let's break down our own barrier!

This initiative was last voted on in spring 2021, when it came very close to passing. In fact, there was a quorum and the majority of members who voted were in favor of eliminating the degree requirement. Unfortunately, that number fell just short of the 2/3 votes required to pass such an amendment. Statistics from the 2021 vote varied significantly around the country, but here in Washington State, we should be proud that just over 1/3 of our members voted, and 76% of them voted to eliminate the degree requirement. 
