I enjoyed learning about physics, medical skills, and other fun topics that were very interesting. The field trips were fun and educational as well, I learned about marine life and planes. Along the way I started to enjoy journaling my experiences. Another great aspect about tech trek was the community; everyone was very kind, friendly, and welcoming. I made many new friends that I talk to from time to time and they taught me tons of new things. This was a super fun and educational experience, and I am very happy I was able to be a part of it. My Tech Trek experience was a great one! Everyone was awesome, I learned lots of things, I made friends with people with the same interests as me (which I still keep in contact with), and I made lasting memories. My Core Class, Wearable Tech, was really fun! We got to make running circuits with servos and LEDs and learned to code it in Python. We also learned about the Internet of Things which is how devices collect and exchange information wirelessly. Some examples of these items that use the Internet of Things include smart doorbells, security cameras, and smart watches. I also learned quite a large bit from the taste of core classes. In Marine Biology we got to learn about the different types of plankton and got to study some water with some microscopic beings swimming or floating around in it! In Fun With Physics, we got to learn about temperature, and afterwards we got to make ice cream which taught us about the freezing point of water and how molecules in the water move according to temperature! In Microscopic World we learned how microscopes work and how we can make them ourselves at home with some water, parchment paper, and cardboard. Then we got to study some everyday things like a blade of grass, a flower, some granules of salt and other things some of those things have some small textures that aren't visible without the microscopes. I learned about the sun and space, I also learned about the different types of sunspots at the phases of the moon lab. In another lab Catch and Release we got to do interesting experiments on how different chemicals react with each other.

On the field trips I had loads of fun. My group went to the harbor where we learned about what marine biologists do, which was very intriguing to learn about. One of the best parts was learning how to read the animal skulls that were given to us for studying. The animal skull I was trying to figure out was a bottlenose dolphin (I didn't end up correctly guessing it). We also got to explore the touch tanks where there were sea stars, sea urchins, and some weird plant life. In the ocean we also found some really cool jellyfishes. At the museum of flight my partner and I got to learn about different types of ways for the pilot of the airplane to tell where they are and how high they are flying. We went through a pre-flight checklist with a real plane indoors. We got to figure out if the plane was ready for take-off. The plane in fact was not ready for take-off as there was a fake bird's nest with a small fake bird inside the front of the plane. The field trips were really interesting and fun! One of the most educational things was Professional Women's Night, even though it was stifling hot I have a newfound interest in Rocket Engineering.

Tech Trek did a lot for me in one small week. I made new friends at our created Uno table where everyone was welcome. I still keep in touch with my new friends even though the distance between us all is large. I got to keep precious mementos of my time at Tech Trek, I learned so much, and got a new interest in a possible career in rocket science. I got to celebrate one of my new friends' birthdays at Tech Trek and that was one of the most prominent memories. As I interacted with the Tech Trek Community, I felt less isolated. After Tech Trek I feel more confident in my social skills and handling situations alone. I also feel more self-assured after meeting more girls my age with similar interests. Everyone at Tech Trek was super nice and I wish I could go to Tech Trek again (Maybe when I'm 16?). So, to sum up my experience Tech Trek was a really great place that I really enjoyed.

My Tech Trek Experience

If I had one word to describe Tech Trek, it would be amazing! To start off, my main class at the camp was an astronomy class titled, "Amazing Moons." In that class, we tackled off topics like solar/lunar eclipses, moon phases, and Jupiter's four main moons, Europa, Io, Callisto, Ganymede. We used hands-on-learning activities to better enhance our learning experience. For example, one of my favorites was making moon ball models (made through stuffing a pencil into a ball) and moving around a lightbulb in the middle of the room. This led to it casting a shadow casting, allowing us to understand phases of the moon. Our final project for that class was to make a suitable base on one of Jupiter's moons using objects from a craft box. My moon was Callisto, and I participated by creating a greenhouse since it's very cold there!

Next, the labs. We had bite-sized activities in the afternoon each day, and the most appealing to me was my finance class. We were brought to a gym where we were given tablets. On it was an app where you pretended to be a working adult with a family who must make it through seven rounds of purchases on a month's salary. You also were given a credit score based on how you answered the questionnaire at the start. I liked how realistic it was, with the purchases being about shopping, food, kids, etc. Even by the end, I ended up with zero dollars even though I had a great credit score (around 800) and salary... (Most of my leftover money went towards debt and the rest towards savings)

Field trips! I went to Harbor Wild Watch in Gig Harbor, and the Museum of Flight! In HWW, we got a look at various tools used to catch fish and sea creatures, touched an animal skull collection, and also touched starfish! To be honest, the best thing I liked about it was eating subway sandwiches. It had a chocolate cookie in the box and it was pretty warm and tasty! Now, onwards to MOF, that was really cool! We split into partners and got to interact with different tools pilots use to fly planes. They also led us to the flight simulator where we pretended to fly and land a plane! My experience? Well, I was doing great keeping it midair, but when it came to landing, I crashed it into the ground. Oops!

Georgette Wald (Vikingstad) Valle

Born on Halloween in 1924 on a Minnesota Farm, to George and Emily (Tenold) Vikingstad, Georgette passed away peacefully in her sleep at home on July 10, 2024.

Georgette graduated from Elmore High School, Waldorf College and the University of Minnesota. At the University of Minnesota, she met a dental student working in the cafeteria, Odd Valle. In 1951, she sailed to Norway where she and Odd were married on June 30, 1951, in his hometown of Odda.




After some deliberation, Georgette and Odd decided to return to the US, to Burien, Washington. After some time at the Burien Garden Apartments, they built a house in Normandy Park. In 1953, Peter was born; and in 1955, Christine.

After managing a state-wide voter registration drive for League of Women Voters in 1950, Georgette decided to run for State Representative in 1962. In 1964, she won her first term in the State Legislature. She served 24 years as a state legislator over a 30-year period. She worked 9 years to pass the state's first non-smoking legislation, the Indoor Clean Air Act.

After retiring as a State Legislator, Georgette served one four-year term on the Burien City Council. She also founded the Environmental Science Center at Seahurst Park. Not yet finished, at the age of 83, Georgette ran for State Senate in Arizona.

Georgette wrote four books, including her Autobiography, "Always a Rebel and Never without a Cause." She swam once or twice a week well into her early 90s and loved playing the organ. She was an active member of many organizations, including the United Church of Christ, Evergreen Democratic Club, Lions Club, American Association of University Women and Daughters of Norway.

Georgette is survived by her children, Christine Goonetilleke, Peter and CoCo Valle; and her grandchildren, Erica and Ameet Sahota, Alicia Goonetilleke, Bryan Goonetilleke and George Valle. Her husband, Odd Valle, preceded her in death in 2012 at the age of 88.

Something started a conversation about habits of husbands, and I joined in saying "You have to remember my husband is from Denmark". Then Georgette said, "Well mine is from Norway", and Georgette immediately started to consider me a close friend as our husbands were both Scandinavians. Looking back, I think I became a surrogate for her sister who was younger than Georgette and with whom she had a difficult relationship. We spent many holiday dinners together. Though my family moved from Normandy Park to Sweden, then upstate NY, and finally SE Arizona, the Valles visited especially if there was a Lions Convention within a half days drive. Madame Restell by Jennifer Wright

Discover the true story of a self-taught surgeon and trailblazing figure in medical history—Madame Restell, a revolutionary surgeon who fought for women's rights and healthcare in Gilded Age New York.

An industrious immigrant who built her business from the ground up, Madame Restell was a self-taught surgeon on the cutting edge of healthcare in pre-Gilded Age New York, and her bustling "boarding house" provided birth control, abortions, and medical assistance to thousands of women—rich and poor alike. As her practice expanded, her notoriety swelled, and Restell established her-self as a prime target for tabloids, threats, and lawsuits galore. But far from fading into the background, she defiantly flaunted her wealth, parading across the city in designer clothes, expensive jewelry, and bejeweled carriages, rubbing her success in the faces of the many politicians, publishers, fellow physicians, and religious figures determined to bring her down.

Unfortunately for Madame Restell, her rise to the top of her field coincided with "the greatest scam you've never heard about"—the campaign to curtail women's power by restricting their access to both healthcare and careers of their own. Powerful, secular men—threatened by women's burgeoning independence—were eager to declare abortion sinful, a position endorsed by newly-minted male MDs who longed to edge out their feminine competition and turn medicine into a standardized, male-only practice. By unraveling the misogynistic and misleading lies that put women's lives in jeopardy, Wright simultaneously restores Restell to her rightful place in history and obliterates the faulty reasoning underlying the very foundation of what has since been dubbed the "pro-life" movement.

Thought-provoking, character-driven, boldly written, and feminist as hell, Madame Restell is required reading for anyone and everyone who believes that when it comes to women's rights, women's bodies, and women's history, **women should have the last word**. (*Amazon*)



The Hello Girls, by Elizabeth Cobbs

This is the story of how America's first women soldiers helped win World War I, earned the vote, and fought the U.S. Army. In 1918, the U.S. Army Signal Corps sent 223 women to France. They were masters of the latest technology: the telephone switchboard. General John Pershing, commander of the American Expeditionary Forces, demanded female "wire experts" when he discovered that inexperienced doughboys were unable to keep him connected with troops under fire. Without communications for even an hour, the army would collapse.

While suffragettes picketed the White House and President Woodrow Wilson struggled to persuade a segregationist Congress to give women of all races the vote, these competent and courageous young women swore the Army oath. Elizabeth Cobbs reveals the challenges they faced in a war zone where male soldiers welcomed, resented, wooed, mocked, saluted, and ultimately celebrated them. They received a baptism by fire when German troops pounded Paris with heavy artillery. Some followed "Black Jack" Pershing to battlefields where they served through shelling and bombardment. Grace Banker, their 25-year-old leader, won the Distinguished Service Medal.

The army discharged the last Hello Girls in 1920, the same year Congress ratified the Nineteenth Amendment granting the ballot. When the operators sailed home, the army unexpectedly dismissed them without veterans' benefits. They began a sixty-year battle that a handful of survivors carried to triumph in 1979. With the help of the National Organization for Women, Senator Barry Goldwater, and a crusading Seattle attorney, they triumphed over the U.S. Army. (*Amazon*)
